Dear Carleton Church Family and Friends,

As I think of and remember each of you, know that you are in my thoughts and prayers. I know most of you who are reading this cannot attend worship services or watch it online, and/or need to stay home for one or more reasons, including staying safe as we continue to go through this pandemic with COVID.
